The Tällberg Forum 2005

Between 30 July – 3 August 2005, 450 leaders of over 70 nationalities broke out of their daily lives and came together in the village of Tällberg. For five days, they talked about and reflected on global governance and the frameworks necessary for global sustainable interdependence.

The Tällberg Forum makes no declarations and issues no recommendations. Its aim is to provide leaders from business, government and civil society as well as influential thought-leaders with a forum to discuss important issues in a calm and inspiring environment. The Forum's result lies in the many initiatives and ideas that the participants bring back home and integrate in their actions as leaders.

While working on bringing together diversity in background and in thinking, the Tällberg Forum rests firmly on a commitment to humanistic values and the adoption of a systems approach.

The Tällberg Forum 2006 is tentatively set for 28 June - 1 July 2006, in Tällberg, Sweden.















An innovating format in a different setting

It is the combination of place, people and process that makes the Tällberg Forum unique. The informality and beauty of the place has a decisive influence. The environment, in which people can freely, unpretentiously and creatively converse, conveys harmony and aesthetics.

The people are chosen to provide diversity of men and women, of old and young, and a true mix of nationalities from all continents: Politicians, global corporate leaders, thought leaders, artists, clerics, civic leaders and NGO leaders. Many participants bring their families and this strongly influences the atmosphere.

The process and program allow for each participant to combine sessions, talks and discussions with excursions, walks in the woods or spending time with their family. The conference program is a blend of plenary sessions and workshops with up to 30 participants. The conversations carry on in smaller settings, notably the reflection groups of ten to which participants are allocated to explore in more depth subjects of their choice. Cultural performances and nature walks are an integral part of the program, as they help open minds and stimulate ideas.

Talking about global interdependence

Thousands of conversations took place during the five days of the Tällberg Forum 2005. Some of them were parts of the program's different elements, many more were the outcome of informal meetings of participants. The overriding theme of the Forum was "How on Earth Can We Live Together? Exploring Frameworks for Sustainable Global Interdependence".

Many themes were raised in the 2005 program and many more were discussed in countless spontaneous conversations. Several common topics were raised: The specific issue of climate change was omnipresent, as was the more general question of ecnomic, environmental and social sustainability. Here, a mood of rising frustration and anger at the slow pace of change could be felt. Also, there is a need for a continued deeper reflection on the crucial role of business, since it is both the main engine and primary beneficiary of globalization. Further, the problem posed by the wide gap in the speed of change of business and of governance needs special attention.
