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# SHAME THEM!

**MANAMA: Journalists who spread messages of hate should be publicly shamed, according to an international expert.**

The media should have freedom, but must only tell the truth and give both sides of the story, stressed former Canadian prime minister Jean Chrétien.

"I think media that spread hatred should be denounced and shamed publicly," he told the GDN.

Mr Chrétien was speaking on the sidelines of a Press conference at the conclusion of the 31st annual plenary meeting at the Ritz-Carlton Bahrain, Hotel and Spa yesterday.

The three-day event, organised by the InterAction Council, was held under the patronage of His Royal Highness Prince Salman bin Hamad Al Khalifa, Crown Prince, Deputy Supreme Commander and First Deputy Premier.

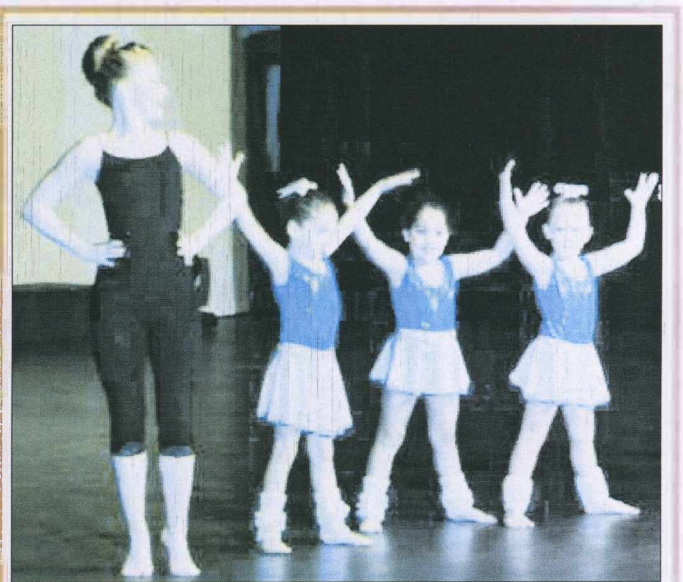
Mr Chrétien, who is also the council's co-chairman, said Bahrain is playing a key role in efforts to create a nuclear-free Middle East.

"The progress is slow but it is possible and we could have no-nuclear zones in many regions including the Middle East, South America and Africa," Mr Chrétien said.

The meeting reviewed the present state of the world, the water-energy-food nexus, religious divide and nuclear non-proliferation, he said.

It concluded with 44 recommendations on each theme, which will be distributed to world leaders and policy-makers. Some of the recommendations include encouraging governments to seek multilateral and sustained co-operation, ceasing construction and expansion of new settlements in Palestinian territories and East Jerusalem by Israel, urging Iran to fully implement its Safeguards Agreement and its other obligations.

## Health alert to block virus

**MANAMA:** Health authorities were yesterday urged to take immediate pre-emptive measures to avert a potential outbreak of Sars-like coronavirus in Bahrain.

"Forty-three per cent of the coronavirus-related death cases in the world have been reported in neighbouring Saudi Arabia," Foreign Affairs, Defence and National Security Committee member and MP Sawsan Tagawi said. She called on the Health Ministry to outline detailed contingency plans to contain potential outbreak in Bahrain and allay people's fears. She urged the ministry to set up health checkpoints at different entry points to avert any coronavirus infections among travellers arriving in Bahrain.

## Election boycott call condemned

**MANAMA:** Bahrain will not tolerate attempts by anyone to derail forthcoming parliamentary elections by fomenting violence or spreading chaos, a top government minister warned last night.

Such incitement, reminiscent of the February 2011 unrest, will be met with the force of law, Justice, Islamic Affairs and Endowments Minister Shaikh Khalid bin Ali Al Khalifa said.

He made the remarks following a recent statement by Al Wafaq National Islamic Society secretary-general Shaikh Ali

Salman during an event at a Samahej mosque in which he openly announced a demonstration with the aim of crippling the elections, which are scheduled to be held next year.

He said political pluralism and sustained development can only be achieved through fair competition rather than instigation to violence and adoption of terrorism and intimidation tactics that were used during the 2011 by-elections.

"There is no place for anyone whose main target is to obstruct the nation-building process."

MANAMA: The role of security in promoting development and achieving progress and prosperity was stressed yesterday.

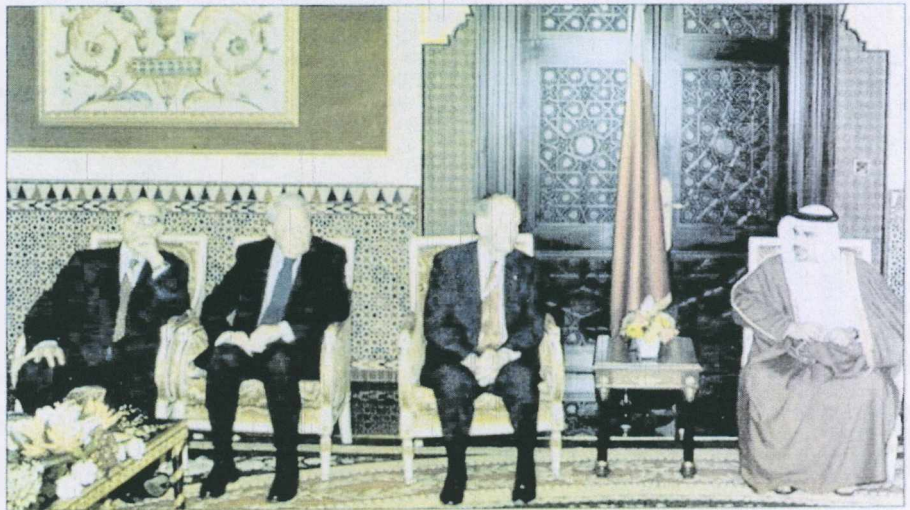

## InterAction Council gets rolling in Bahrain

ceremony of the InterAction Council yesterday at the Ritz Carlton in Seef saw the participation of several former world leaders who are expected to discuss the region's most pertinent issues in the coming days.

The 31st Annual Plenary Meeting of the InterAction Council being held in Bahrain for the first time is being organised under the Patronage of Crown Prince, Deputy Supreme Commander and First Deputy Prime Minister HRH Prince Salman bin Hamad Al Khalifa.

The council is an organisation of former world leaders who gather to discuss current world issues in order to provide solutions based on their past experiences as decision makers.

The welcome message on the occasion was delivered by Deputy Prime Minister Shaikh Mohammed bin Mubarak Al Khalifa who was deputised by the Crown Prince to attend the opening ceremony.

He was followed by former

Canadian Prime Minister and InterAction Council co-chair Jean Chretien who gave the attendees an introduction on the organisation. The keynote was then delivered by Former Jordanian Prime Minister and InterAction Council Member Dr. Abdel Salam Majali who highlighted some of the issues of the Middle East and its root causes.

The opening ceremony then ended with several words of appreciation from former Austrian Chancellor and InterAction Council Co-Chair

Dr. Franz Vranitzky. The keynote delivered by Dr. Majali has set the tone of the discussions which will be on for the next few days. One of the issues he highlighted in his keynote is the importance of pushing for nuclear non-proliferation and eventual disarmament of nuclear powered and armed countries.

"This region is very unique. It includes four countries that aspire to be part of the club of nuclear-armed nations. It has one of the richest and also one of the poorest countries in the

world. In the Middle East, the situation is critical. We must all lobby for a nuclear free region or otherwise, we will have a nightmare on our hands," said the former Jordanian president.

### Need for constitutional govts

"In the past few years, events that have occurred throughout the region have been come to be known as the Arab Spring - but in my belief it is a spring that has not fully blossomed yet," Dr. Majali said.

"It may have started as an

internal affair, but soon after, international powers have rushed in to protect their own private interests and later they turned it into a more complicated situation."

He added that what countries can learn from this is that autocratic, one-party leaderships can no longer an accepted form of government.

### Subjected to political whims

He highlighted that the Gulf region has been always known as a region of peace

and Bahrain has been a paramount of ongoing reform, effectively transforming itself into a constitutional monarchy in the last ten years.

"However, owing to its strategic geographical location, it has been subjected to the political whims of the regional powers. What is clear, however, is that regional powers interfering in internal affairs of other nations is no longer a valid way to gain hegemony," Dr. Majali added.

# Global security issues in focus

COMBATING nuclear weapons and bridging religious divisions are being discussed by high-profile experts in Bahrain.

Twenty former heads of states, leading academics and policy makers are taking part in the 11st annual plenary meeting of the InterAction Council at the Ritz-Carlton Bahrain Hotel and Spa.

The three-day event, held under the patronage of His Royal Highness Prince Salman bin Hamad Al Khalifa, Crown Prince, Deputy Supreme Commander and First Deputy Prime Minister, is jointly chaired by former Canadian Prime Minister Jean Chrétien and former Australian chancellor Dr Tony Abbott.

It was officially opened by Crown Prince Mohammed bin Mubarak Al Khalifa yesterday.

Participants will tackle issues of global security, peace and democracy, including the present state of the world, alternative energy sources, bridging the religious divide and nuclear non-proliferation.

Former Indonesian Prime Minister Dr Abdurrahman Wahid delivered the Ashd Shaleh at the opening of the event, saying the springing die are fully thrown.

"The 11 events may have started off as an Arab Spring

but very soon international players joined the bandwagon to ensure that their interests in this vital world region were not overlooked," he said.

"The essential lessons that all countries can draw from the events of the last two years is that democracy as a mode of governance can no longer be acceptable to the public."

"Kings seem to favour functioning monarchies rather than despotic, one-party autocracies."

"However, a system of an all-encompassing, multiparty democracy has to prevail and political pluralism should be the norm of the future."

Dr Magdi delivered the keynote speech, entitled 'Uprisings in the Arab World: The Reality Beyond the Future of Politics

and Policies, where he said peace has prevailed in the Gulf region for decades.

"Bahrain has been a vanguard of the reform movement in the region. Quietly, yet effectively, it has been transforming itself into a constitutional monarchy over the last 10 years," he said.

"Owing to its geographical location, it has also been subjected to political winds blowing across the region."

The participating experts include International Atomic Energy Agency director general Yukiya Amano, Saudi Arabia's Supreme Economic Council secretary-general Dr Naim Al Moneef, Global Strategy Forum chairman Lord Michael Loftham and religious scholar and best-selling author

Dr Reza Aslan.

InterAction Council secretary general Thomas Axworthy earlier said their mandate was to look at some of the most pressing regional issues as they affect the global community and make recommendations to current world leaders and policy makers on how the international community can best respond.

In addition to the roundtable deliberations, participants will also visit some cultural landmarks.

The council holds its meetings in a different country every year and last met in the Middle East in May 2009 in Saudi Arabia.

## Regional powers urged to give up nuclear ambitions

REGIONAL powers have been urged to give up their nuclear ambitions, according to a leading expert.

International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons co-chairwoman Dr Rebecca Johnson said Iran, Pakistan, India and Israel should take steps to engage in a process to eliminate nuclear weapons.

"That will ensure Iran will not feel threatened and find its own nuclear weapons' ambitions too expensive and too bothersome to pursue," she told the GDN on the sidelines of the 11st plenary session of the InterAction Council yesterday.

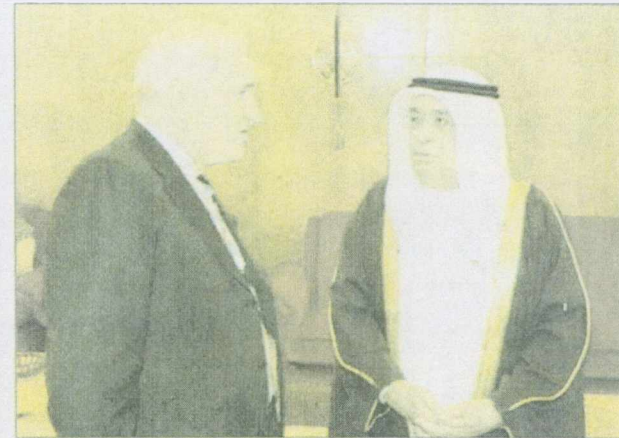
"Questions are asked all the time as to what

Iran would do with its nuclear programme. They say they are developing nuclear energy for peaceful purposes but the world remains in doubt."

She said the problem is that Iran's nuclear programme is not open to outside inspection.

"They have their own regulatory and own operators and there is no independent body to monitor their programme. That is where the problem is," she said.

Ms Johnson said other issues include developing nuclear weapons. "The use of nuclear weapons will be far more dangerous than if there was an accident at a nuclear plant, so there should be proper guidelines," she added.

Others include enhancing public education campaigns to raise awareness about water scarcity and need for conservation, developing policies and

creating incentives to encourage private sector investment.

Additionally, the council suggested future meetings among countries in the Middle East to create a nuclear-free zone.

"This issue is very important as the goal for us is to have a world without nuclear weapons," said Mr Chretien.

"The progress is slow but possible and could have no nuclear zones in many regions including the Middle East, South America and Africa."

Meanwhile, former Cypriot president George Vassiliou said nuclear power would always create tension.

"One country would want to feel secure and gain such power, but then others will also want it and it will go on," he said.

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## ■ BICI member to attend probe

A SENIOR member of the Bahrain Independent Commission of Inquiry (BICI) is due to give evidence during the latest session of a British parliamentary inquiry into the UK's relations with Saudi Arabia and Bahrain. Former UN special rapporteur on human rights Sir Nigel Rodley will speak to senior MPs during Tuesday's event, at Portcullis House in Westminster, London.

Opposition activist Maryam Al Khawaja, the Denmark-based spokeswoman for the now-defunct Bahrain Centre for Human Rights, will also give evidence along with Amnesty International Middle East and North Africa director Phil Luthor and UK Human Rights Watch director David Mepham. Several prominent British figures who have lived and worked in the Gulf previously submitted extensive written testimonials as evidence to the House of Commons inquiry. They include former ambassadors, retired military figures, businessmen, existing and former residents and human rights activists. Several senior British MPs last month travelled to Saudi Arabia and Bahrain to meet prominent expatriates and opposition figures as part of the inquiry. The delegation, from the House of Commons Foreign Affairs Select Committee, flew into Manama as part of attempts to gather the facts on the ground. It included former Liberal Democrats leader Sir Menzies Campbell, Labour party MPs Ann Clwyd and Mike Gapes and Conservative MPs Sir John Stanley and Rory Stewart.

FIREMEN were called to put out a blaze at a restaurant in Muharraq yesterday.
