Dear Mr. Cañellas,

I would like to thank you for your letter dated 13.10.2000 by which you presented to the Primeminister the proposals and recommendations of the European Ombudsman Institute regarding the content of the Charter of Fundamental Rights of the EU. The Convention that was entrusted with the drafting of the Charter has taken into consideration the views of all the non-governmental organizations which took part in the public hearings and submitted their proposals.

Given this opportunity, I would like to stress the fact that the Charter is the outcome of an indeed difficult in reaching a consensus procedure among a great number of representatives in the Convention. Thus, its content may at first sight appear insufficient, as regards the level of protection for some rights, but the final draft of the Charter as a whole does provide a solid ground of protection with potential to expand for the European people and citizens vis-à-vis the powers of the community institutions.
